

## Electives

Students select two electives. One of the electives must be outside of the social sciences and one must have an ethics or social justice emphasis; these two conditions may be fulfilled by the same course.

Students may not count more than a total of two courses from their major toward the six courses required for the minor; as a result, Economics and Accounting majors may not use Economics or Accounting courses as electives. Students with double majors may count two courses from each major (e.g. a HIST/POLS double major could count two history and two political science courses).

Although it is not necessary that both electives tie directly to the student's social issue, theme, or capstone project, student applications must provide a justification for how each course contributes to their particular proposed curriculum. Selected electives approved by the committee and faculty thus far are listed below. An asterisk marks electives that satisfy the ethics or social justice emphasis. Students are encouraged to propose alternative electives that fit the topic or theme of their minor as appropriate, with the permission of the faculty member offering the course.
