



TOWARDS AN ECONOMIC ANTHROPOLOGY OF CATHOLICISM IN THE AGE OF POPE FRANCIS

FFBRUARY 2024

This issue, which focused on the historical and politico-economic dimensions of contemporary Catholicism, came more than a decade into the papacy of Francis. Pope Francis's unique navigation through global issues and employment of community dialogue inspired this issue's diverse scholarship, led by guest editors Samuel Weeks, Assistant Professor of Anthropology at Thomas Jefferson University, and George Bayuga, Assistant Professor in the Department of Anthropology at the University of Colorado Colorado Springs.





CONFERENCE / APRIL 18 AND 19, 2024

April 7, 2024, marked the 30th commemoration of the genocide against the Tutsis in Rwanda. In solidarity with Rwandans, this two-day symposium gathered international scholars to unpack the complex role of the Catholic church in the genocide and its aftermath, as well as explore broader implications for the global church today.

Rev. Marcel Uwineza, SJ, a genocide survivor, presented the keynote, "Theology and Ecclesiology from Wounds of the Genocide."

This Catholics & Cultures conference was organized by Audrey Seah, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies, with additional funding from the Kraft-Hiatt program. The talks will result in an upcoming issue of the *JGC*.


